It has truly been an honor to serve as the president of Junior Service League in our 82nd year. I am so thankful to be a part of such an outstanding group of women in our community and have the great pleasure to lead this group of women. What we can do for our community as a group is truly immeasurable. It is so much bigger than a few service hours, or grants that we give. This group of women shows up and leads in all different areas of Shawnee. I am proud of what we have accomplished for Shawnee.

The 2019-2020 Provisional Class will finish this year with five members. These women were shepherded through a great first year and will be incredible assets to this community and this organization.

We kicked off this year with our annual Summer Social in the backyard of Theopolis Social Club, hosted by the class of 2018-2019. The evening was a fun-filled, lemon-themed get together while we also began preparations for Kick-Off supper.

The efforts from Kick-Off Supper allowed us to award \$10,675 to ten Shawnee High School graduating seniors. The Kick-Off supper chairs this year were; Annie Minnigh, Johnna Ervin, Hayley Gibson and Sylvia Columbus. This is a fun event we all look forward to being apart of every year. It serves to kick off our year as well as the Shawnee Wolves football team!

With the conclusion of KOS, we geared up for the Pumpkin season! Kristene Willis, April Shepherd, April Reynolds, Jordan Cleveland and Jennelle Thompson were our pumpkin chairs this year, and did an excellent job preparing for the project and keeping things in order at the patch. These women contributed countless hours by themselves, created new ways to engage the membership at the patch, and collectively our organization completed over 915 hours of service on this project alone! We were able to sell, decorate and deliver a total of 902 pumpkins adorable pumpkins and therefore allocate \$12,520 back to the community. This year we added an adorable new pumpkin for Halloween, the Boo, and she was quite the hit!

We had a wonderful Christmas party at the home of Haley Cox to present another opportunity for the Provisionals to mingle with Actives in a more casual setting. We know it is important for those relationships to foster early on for each member to truly get the greatest experience out of League!

We moved our Sustaining Tea to the Spring in hopes for better weather. In past years, the winter weather has been a hindrance for Sustaining Members to attend. Our Sustaining Representative, Leanne Howard, hosted a beautiful brunch in her home. The weather was perfect, and we packed her house with both Sustaining Members and

Active Members. Leanne created beautiful brunch charcuterie boards, and it was a great time mingling with all.

Unfortunately to a global pandemic, Covid-19, we navigated the Spring a little differently than normal years. Our Sustaining Tea was the last event we were able to have for the 2019-2020 year. We navigated as we went, but ultimately chose to cancel the Get Acquainted Social that we had planned on the patio at First United Bank. As times were still rocky, we ultimately cancelled Ragin' Cajun and the Spring Luncheon, as well.

Ragin' Cajun was originally postponed to the summer, but once we got closer, we decided to cancel the event altogether. Through amazing and gracious donors, we were still able to allocate \$18,691 in grants to our local non-profit organizations. This is always our largest fundraiser of the year and a fun night for our members, as well as the community, so it was heartbreaking to all to cancel this event. Our chairs this year were Heather Acock, Kristen Dude, Rachel Ervin, Julia Holland and Lauren Simpson. These women had a challenging task set before them in the decision to cancel the event, even after countless hours of work had gone into the planning of the event. I am so grateful to these ladies for their hard work. Because of their hard work, we were still able to give back to our community, in a time when our community needed it the most.

Throughout the year, we were able to sponsor and participate in events that were hosted by other non-profits in our community, too. We sponsored the Community Market's Harvest Moon dinner, Community Renewal's newest fundraiser, We-Care-oke, Project Safe's Honey Do Auction and Legacy Parenting's Tapas & Trivia. We are proud that we are able to support other organizations throughout the year outside of our annual Spring and Fall grants, too! Meetings for the year were abruptly cut short soon after, but yearend business was seamlessly concluded by FaceBook posts, texts and Zoom meetings.

KICK OFF SUPPER REPORT

Kickoff Supper was held before the first Shawnee High School home football game on Friday, September 6, 2019. It took place in the lobby of the high school's Performing Arts Center from 5:00pm to 7:00pm.

Continuing with the change from the previous year, we served pulled pork sandwiches with a bag of chips, pickle, and a cookie. Individual tickets were \$7 each and each member had to sell 12 tickets (or a sponsorship that included 12 tickets). Sponsorship levels varied from \$50 donations, \$150 donations which included 6 tickets, \$250 donations which included 12 tickets, or \$300 donations which included 12 tickets and use of the company's logo on promotional and marketing items.

Sponsorship packets, along with a list of the previous year's sponsors was posted on Facebook a couple of weeks prior to KOS packets being passed out at the summer

social. This gave members ample opportunity sell sponsorships. Packets with KOS information, KOS sponsor forms and 12 tickets were passed out at the Summer Social. We also had labeled envelopes ready to collect money for cookies and shirts which helped keep everything organized. We asked members to pay \$5 for cookies. JSL member shirts were \$16 each, and we had several sustaining members order as well. We also did a small scale sale of the shirts to the public. We sold 21 shirts for a profit of \$119.

We sold a total of 198 individual tickets, 56 sponsorships which included 476 tickets, for a total of 674 tickets sold. We sold 14 tickets at the door and served 349 people (335 people came with pre-purchased tickets). We fed CHOM for free at 4:30 prior to the event. CHOM performed at 6:00. We ask they please perform the fight song and Shawnee will shine. We offered to feed the band but they declined.

First United Bank was our title sponsor for the evening. They donated \$1000 and canceled their weekly tailgate to help encourage people to attend KOS. In return we placed table tents on the dinner tables with info about their tailgate, and hung their banner at the entrance. They also had the largest logo on the back of the shirt and received special recognition over the PA system during the football game.

Pinecliffe Printers printed all KOS tickets and packets for free and in return received a large logo on the back of the shirt and special recognition over the PA system at the game.

Boomerang donated the boats, napkins, chips, pickles, and buns. In return received a large logo on the back of the shirt and special recognition over the PA system at the game, along with signs by the food.

Firelake Discount Foods donated a \$250 gift card, and charged us significantly less than retail on the pulled pork (\$8 per pound). CPN also bought a \$300 sponsorship. In return received a large logo on the back of the shirt and special recognition over the PA system at the game, along with signs by the food.

We purchased the cookies from Sam's in Midwest City. We ordered 5 mixed trays with 84 cookies per tray for a total of \$97.54. Next year we will ask for no M&M cookies (they were much smaller than the other cookies) and do 2 full trays of chocolate chip cookies and 3 mixed trays.

We borrowed three roaster pans from Wesley United Methodist Church to keep food warm while serving. Kat at Firelake said we could also borrow their warmers if need be, but they would need to be returned the following morning. BHHS Benchmark Realty donated 250 water bottles and Oklahoma Pure donated 12 cases of soda. We offered face painting again this year, for \$3 each. We painted 50 faces and made \$151. We also painted CHOM faces for free if they chose to have it done. Caroline Skinner secured us a designer bag raffle and a perfume basket raffle from Dillard's. We sold raffle tickets for \$5 each and made \$195 from it.

Total monies received for KOS 2019 was \$13,897.88. Total expenses were \$2,036.77. 10% of profit went to the money market account (\$1,186.11). Net profit for KOS 2019

was \$11,861.11. We were able to allocate \$10,675 to Shawnee High School students for scholarships, including the Taylor Ricks Scholarship.

We had an amazing year. We will look at revamping the work schedule as there is a lot of down time during prep shifts. We also opted not to put the banners up this year, but are considering making yard signs for next year, for JSL girls to put in their front yards.

PUMPKIN PATCH REPORT

This year was a great year for Junior Service League pumpkins! We were able to sell a total of 902 pumpkins this year. We added a new pumpkin design, The Boo pumpkin. The sales were as follows: monogram (275), scarecrow (175), fall floral (197), and miss autumn (62) boo (184), custom (9).

Once again, Don Britton from Don's Plants generously allowed us to use his facility and took care of all our pumpkins needs. KOS supper chairs agreed to add Don as a sponsor for his kindness. We changed up how we washed the pumpkins in the beginning so we didn't have much of an issue with rotting this year.

We had three new pumpkin chairs this year, April Reynolds, Jennelle Thompson and Kristene Willis. The chairs who had served their three years rolled off were Tiffany Williams, Julia Holland, and Lauren Simpson.

The Provisionals met July 23rd for two hours to help with hat cutting. The Provisionals also met September 21st to help with washing and unloading pumpkins. We split the two hour shifts into a morning and afternoon shift to allow for more flexibility. We used a water hose to wash and sprayed the pumpkins with vinegar to keep from rotting. We organized the pumpkins by size to help when decorating. We designated large pumpkins for the scarecrow, while the others were sized as usual. We continued the process of placing cardboard on the wire tables, under the pumpkins, to help keep the bottoms from getting nicked or damaged.

Members had approximately a month to take orders and all pumpkin money was due at the time of the order. Each member was required to sell 10 pumpkins. Decorating dates were **September 22nd through October 5th**. We changed patch hours this year and started a bit later in the mornings and extended Sunday hours based on feedback we had received. Patch hours were from 10 am – 8:00 pm Monday-Saturday and 11:00 am -8:00 pm on Sunday. On Saturdays we had breakfast and coffee ready for the members. One Saturday, we did door prizes. Members completed approximately 850 hours, including the chairs. Required hours were 1 hour selling/delivering, 11 hours decorating for a total of 12 hours for members. 16 hours were required for provisional, 1 hour selling/delivering, 11 hours decorating, 2 hours for hat cutting, and 2 hours for unloading/ washing. This year we donated one pumpkin to Don's as a Thank You.

For the fifth year, we continued our new process for signing out completed pumpkins which helped eliminate disappearing tags and pumpkins. The process comprised of initialing and turning in the completed tags to a pumpkin chair before taking the pumpkin from the patch. We also included a Thank You tag to the completed pumpkins. We added a new feature of checking in at the patch on an iPad through an app that would

track the time spent at the patch. Members were required to check-in upon arrival and check-out when finished for the day. Overall, it was a smooth transition from logging your hours in a book and a chair having to manually transfer it into excel.

Again, this year, we had the opportunity to print a few business logos with Kristina Degraffenreid through the Boomerang offices. This allowed us to apply the vinyl logos to the pumpkins without having to hand draw and fill in logos. Otherwise, we used the same monograms as last year. We asked members to write a check for \$10 at the summer social to go towards ribbon!

Approximately 300 scarecrow hats were cut out by our Provisionals at a two-hour meeting in July at Kristene Willis's house.

Our gross profit was \$22,550 from pumpkins this year. We paid \$3.88 per pumpkin totaling \$3,503.50 plus supply expenses of \$7,215.94. We had a sales tax of \$1,951.12. We were able to allocate **\$12,520** back to the community.

RAGIN CAJUN REPORT

Ragin' Cajun was scheduled to be held on April 18, 2020 at the Heart of Oklahoma Exposition Center. Due to Covid-19 the event was delayed until June 20, 2020. After monitoring the virus, the Ragin Cajun chairs along with a vote from the members, decided it was safest for the community to cancel Ragin Cajun.

Many sponsorships and tickets had already been sold before the cancellation had been determined. Once the event was cancelled, a letter was mailed out to all donors and ticket holders informing them about the cancellation. They were given the choice to donate their contribution or request a refund.

Total monies received were \$27,932.50. Our expenses were \$1,081.16. Refunds were \$8,185.00 Net total was \$18,681.34. Exec. Board voted to forgo Money market this year and allocate the funds. We allocated \$18,681.34

We have not scheduled event for 2021 yet. We are continuing to monitor the situation with Covid-19 and are brainstorming and researching other ideas for Ragin Cajun 2021.

Thank you to everyone for selling sponsorships and tickets. Thank you for helping chairs contact every sponsor and ticket holder to offer them a refund or opportunity to continue to donate. We could not have pivoted and still allocated funds without everyone's help and support. It was a different year, but so glad that we were still able to give back to our Shawnee community.

CIVIC AND WELFARE REPORT

In 2019-2020, we were able to allocate **\$41,700.00** to the Shawnee community through grants and scholarships. The hard work of our members in three Ways and Means projects made this possible.

We were able to award a total of \$12,520.00 in Fall Grants. The money raised from our Pumpkin Sales was designated for these grants. For the Fall Grant application cycle, we received requests from 27 different community organizations requesting over \$38,600.00 in funding. The committee voted to provide funding to 20 of the 27 grant applications. The recipients are as follows:
